Training to be resilient

Nicole Keefler is delighted to have recently moved to her new office next to local chiropractor, Dr. Michael Wexel, where they share a waiting room. We faced each other in her bright, small office and began with her life story.

She grew up in Westmount, but knew Montreal West like the back of her hand because her best friend lived here. She attended École Secondaire Saint-Luc, Marianopolis and Concordia, graduating with a degree in Art Education. Much of her life has been on two tracks: one in the arts and the other in psychology.

After finishing university, Nicole worked for an animation company. She began by formatting scripts sent in by various writers, but quickly moved up to become a full-fledged script writer. She had a wonderful career writing scripts for children's TV shows like *Franklin*, *Babar* and the *Adventures of Badou*, *Bali* and *The Busy World of Richard Scarry*.

The birth of her first daughter, however, led to a shift in her priorities so Nicole turned to her other love, working with people.

She volunteered as a companion to people suffering from agoraphobia and it wasn't long before Nicole was hired to head the program. She also found great purpose as a facilitator of their anxiety management program and led groups for hundreds of men and women with anxiety disorders.

The family moved to Mo West and welcomed two additions. By 2005, Nicole assumed the role of Executive Director of the Anxiety Disorders Association of Canada (today called Anxiety Canada) of which she was a founding board member. But she had to resign when her then husband was transferred to Philadelphia in 2007. The US financial crisis brought the family back to Mo West the following year.

The next few years proved to be the most challenging in her life, but ultimately the most rewarding as it led to her to her true passion: grief recovery work and life coaching.

Dealing with grief

Back in Montreal, Nicole returned to writing for several TV shows but in the background of her life, she was dealing with grief from successive miscarriages, the deaths of her sister, her brother-in-law and her step-father.

She then went through the upheavals and profound sadness of a divorce. When her grief pushed her to seek support, it changed her emotional life and the course of her work.

Flu vaccination is also free of charge to:

- Healthy children from 6 to 23 months old;
- Healthy people from 60 to 74 years old.

Shawn Mozen and Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu

If you've ever watched the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC), you know that it's as close to a real-life fight as you will see. Athletes that compete in the sport of mixed martial arts (MMA) are trained experts at, as the name implies, blending the various martial arts together. But in the UFC's early days, it was all about style vs. style; matching individual disciplines against one another in order to determine which was superior. And it was clear from the beginning that Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu (BJJ), a type of submission grappling, was the most effective.

Delivering on the promise

BJJ is now popular all over the world and that includes Montreal West, with a new school at Agatsu (202 Ronald Drive), led by its president, **Shawn Mozen**. Mozen has had a long journey in both fitness and martial arts including training in judo, karate, boxing and Krav Maga. He was also the first to introduce kettlebell fitness training in Canada and offer certification seminars for trainers as well as instructional DVDs. Throughout his time teaching fitness and martial arts, he always sought efficiency, tools that would deliver on their promises and help people reach their goals. And that is what led him to BJJ.

"Once I saw it and felt the reality of it, I was hooked because it was just so much fun and it was delivering on that movie promise that you saw, where the little guy, like Bruce Lee, could beat the big guy." Shawn trains under Henry Akins in California and has adopted Akins' teaching philosophy of keeping BJJ true to its roots of being effective for self-defense and not just for competition.

A discipline worth starting

But even for who that never plan on being involved in a fight, Mozen believes BJJ is still a discipline worth starting. "For people not interested in self-defense, it's one of the most fun martial arts you can train because you can actually test it, apply it and know if you're getting better because it's a results-driven martial art."

As a student at Agatsu BJJ, I love that it's a friendly and safe place where I can improve my skills and not worry about getting injured, which is a common reason why people stop training. "You can come in, learn the basics, build up your repertoire of techniques and then eventually evolve where you can apply it in sparring," Mozen says. "I feel that the structure we have here lends itself very well to understanding BJJ in terms of self-defense and practising it in a very safe environment that will allow you to develop your skills and it won't push you into the deep end faster than you're ready for.'

For someone who is interested in trying a class, Shawn keeps it simple. "The truth is, you don't have to be in good shape to come and do this. Whatever shape you're in, whatever experience you have, just get yourself through the door. Everyone here wants you to be successful and enjoy BJJ as much as they do. As long as you get yourself through the door, we will offer you the best possible experience to see what BJJ is all about."

Doors open to anyone and everyone

What's also unique about *Agatsu* is that Shawn allows his students to train elsewhere if they so desire. "Our doors are open to anyone and everyone. You are welcome to come here no matter what your affiliation or experience is. If you have no experience, we will show you the ropes and explain to you everything that you're going to do so you don't feel lost or overwhelmed."

Mozen's goal is to continue to build his school and teach the kind of jiu-jitsu that got the world excited about it in the first place. If you have any interest in martial arts training, come check it out. You won't regret it!

Roberta Tyler Wood passed away August 27. Berta was a lifetime resident of MoWest, living in the old semi-detached house on Brock Avenue North built by her



The project consists in replacing aging equipment to maintain the reliability of electricity supply, meet future electricity needs and support greater Montréal's economic development:

- Rebuilding an overhead transmission line over a distance of 18 km.
- Conversion to 315 kV of three 120-kV transformer substations in Lachine, Côte-Saint-Luc and Saint-Laurent.

For this project, *Hydro-Québec*, the city of Montreal, the Town of Montreal West and the other municipal partners have committed to work together to promote greening and active transportation initiatives along the existing line right-of-way. The creation of a green corridor could include a bike path, a walking path, recreational amenities and landscaping to improve quality of life for residents.

Hydro-Québec invites the public to meet with its representatives and learn about the project at an open house meeting. Hydro-Québec representatives will inform residents about the proposed project, answer any questions residents may have and gather their comments.

With time, a strong desire awakened in Nicole to help women who were going through divorce. This led her to enrol in Concordia's Professional and Personal Life Coaching Program where she later became a mentor coach. She then did further training in grief recovery, divorce and relationship coaching.

Four years ago, Nicole set up her new business venture in her home office, with the intention of coaching divorced women who wanted to find a new relationship. The clients who came to her, however, were both men and women who were struggling with grief and loss. Over time she decided to make this the focus of her work. Her life experiences and professional training joined forces and she found her calling.

Her practice has grown, and so has her need for a new, larger office! She feels fortunate to have found a space next to Dr. Wexel's.

Loss comes in many forms

I asked Nicole why she thinks focusing on grief has been life-changing for her clients. "Studies have shown that by the age of 50 most people will experience 15 losses in their life, ranging from breakups, to job loses, deaths, moving and health crises.' She explained that there are some 40 types of losses, some more traumatic than others. If unresolved, they pile up and no matter how hard we try to bury our grief, at some point it shows up. And, society expects us to handle it, but most of us are ill-equipped. Society demands a quick recovery, so most of us put on a show of strength even as our insides crumble. We are told time heals, but we really need action to move through our grief. When a car breaks down on the highway, we don't just wait for time to fix it.

Nicole brings her own life experiences and professional knowledge to create a compassionate and safe environment for her clients' unique emotions and responses to all types of loss. She considers it an honour to be part of people's lives when they are suffering and to witness their healing and transformation. Grief recovery isn't about "getting over" losses, it's about recovering from the pain of the loss so people can move forward in their lives.

Nicole lives a short distance away from her new office with her eldest daughter, who is studying Political Science at McGill, her twin daughters, who are studying at Villa Maria, along with **Maggie** their beloved dog. And, she eventually found love again. (We all like happy endings!)



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SPECIAL PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES

The department of Public Works (PW) manages a range of construction and maintenance operations in Town, including our water services, the sewer system, our street network, Town snow clearing, municipal building upkeep, public lighting, horticultural work, public tree management (including the oversight of ash tree vaccinations) and waste management. All these activities are carried out on a regular basis by the department. But in addition, Public Works offers some extra services to residents upon request. For instance:

- PW can assist you with the reading of your property's water meter and, if the meter is broken, will provide and install a new one.
- 2. The department will make a special curbside pickup of items which are prohibited in the regular garbage, including construction materials, large branches (greater than 2 cm in diameter and 1 m in length) and permanent household fixtures (sinks, toilets, etc.). This service excludes the collection of tires, paints, solvents and other hazardous materials, as well as loose soil, earth, rocks and other landscaping debris. Please note that there is a charge for this special pick-up service which is based on the type and volume of materials.
- 3. If your garbage, compost or recycling waste is not picked up by the Town's contracted waste removal companies, PW will pick it up for you. You can either call the PW office or fill out the appropriate form on our website. Then leave your waste container at the curbside and PW will pick it up as soon as possible.
- 4. PW is responsible for trimming, removing and planting trees on the public domain and this includes the street trees in front of residences in Town. If you'd like to have one of these trees trimmed you must fill

- out the online form. Your request will then be placed on the tree trimming list. Please note that tree emergencies (those that jeopardize public or private property or public security) will always take priority over aesthetic tree trimming. If you want to report a sick or dead tree that you think needs to be removed, you can do so by filling out the related form online. Public Works will then send a certified arborist to evaluate the tree and take action based on the arborist's report.
- 5. Of course, we are always happy to hear that you would like to have a tree planted on the public domain in front of your residence. If so, please submit a request online and PW will evaluate the feasibility of your request.

CP Holiday Train



NEW PROPERTY ASSESSMENT ROLL

A new three-year property assessment roll was deposited by the Direction de l'évaluation foncière of the City of Montreal (DEFVM) in September. The new assessment comes into effect January 1, 2020 and will be the basis for your 2020, 2021 and 2022 tax bills. You can find the new valuation of your property by consulting the DEFVM website at beta.montreal.ca/en/how-to/consult-property-assessment-roll.

In assessing the value of a given property, the DEFVM attempts to determine the market value of that property as of July 1, 2018, based on comparative sales in the neighbourhood. Major renovations or improvements to your property will also increase the valuation.

The average increase in valuation for residential properties in Montreal West with this roll was 16.8%. This is comprised of single family homes (+19.1%), condominiums (+6.4%), buildings with 2-5 lodgings (+3.1%) and buildings with 6 lodgings or more (+10.8%). The valuation increase for non-residential properties was 13.8% and 20.4% for vacant lots. With all property types combined, the total assessment roll increased 16.5%.

Across the whole Island of Montreal, assessments increased an average of 13.7%. Among the 15 demerged municipalities, the average valuation increase was 17.8% for all property types combined. These figures indicate a strong real estate market which has heated up substantially since the last assessment roll in 2017 when these same municipalities had average increases in valuation of 3.0%. This is excellent news and means that, on paper anyway, we are all wealthier!

Nevertheless, some residents have expressed concern as to how their increased property valuation will affect their taxes. You can rest assured that a 19% valuation increase does not mean that your property tax will increase by this same amount.

Your property tax is the result of two factors: the "mill" rate (the tax rate charged per \$100 valuation determined by the Town) multiplied by your valuation. When property valuations go up substantially, the mill rate can be adjusted down to help offset the increase.

In accordance with our Strategic Financial Plan, Council has set objectives and has been able to keep property tax increases to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the average-priced home over the past several years. We will attempt to meet that goal again this year. However, properties with assessment increases higher than the average can reasonably expect that their tax increases will be somewhat higher than the CPI. Actual tax rates will only be known in December after the 2020 budget has been approved.

If you think that the assessment of your property is incorrect or does not reflect reality, you may contest it by completing an "Application for review of the real estate assessment roll" which is available online or at the Town Hall. You must state the grounds to support your claim and forward the completed application to the DEFVM by **April 30, 2020**. Keep in mind that if you dispute your assessment, it may be increased, decreased or left unchanged.

DES SERVICES PARTICULIERS OFFERTS PAR LES TRAVAUX PUBLICS MUNICIPAUX

Le Service des travaux publics gère une gamme d'opérations de construction et d'entretien, y compris le réseau d'aqueduc, le réseau d'égouts, le réseau de rues, le déneigement, l'entretien des bâtiments municipaux, l'éclairage public, les travaux d'horticulture, la gestion des arbres publics (comprenant la vaccination des frênes) et la gestion des déchets. Toutes ces activités sont menées régulièrement par le service. De plus, les travaux publics offrent des services supplémentaires aux résidents qui en font la demande, par exemple :

- I. Le service des travaux publics peut vous aider avec la lecture de votre compteur d'eau. Aussi, un nouveau compteur vous sera remis et installé si le compteur est défectueux.
- 2. Le service fait des collectes spéciales pour ramasser les articles qui sont interdits lors de la collecte d'ordure régulière. Ceci comprend des matériaux de construction, des branches de plus de 2 cm de diamètre et I mètre de longueur, ainsi que des accessoires fixes d'une maison (éviers, cuvettes de toilette, etc.). Les travaux publics ne ramasseront pas des pneus, de la peinture, du solvant ou tout autre matériel ou produit dangereux ainsi que de la terre, des roches et d'autres débris d'aménagement paysager. Veuillez noter que ceci est un service payant qui est basé sur le type et le volume des matériaux ramassés.
- 3. Si vos déchets, compost ou recyclage ne sont pas ramassés par les contractants engagés par la Ville, les Travaux publics les ramasseront pour vous. Vous pouvez soit remplir le formulaire sur notre site Web ou bien appeler la réception des travaux publics. Laissez ensuite votre bac en bordure de la rue et le service des travaux publics passera le prendre aussitôt que possible.
- 4. Les Travaux publics sont responsables de l'élagage, de l'abattage et de la plantation des arbres publics, incluant tous les arbres dans l'emprise municipale devant votre

- terrain. Vous devez remplir le formulaire en ligne si vous voulez qu'un arbre de la Ville soit taillé. Votre requête sera placée sur la liste appropriée. Veuillez noter que les urgences qui compromettent les biens publics et/ou la propriété privée (ou les cas visant la sécurité publique) auront toujours priorité sur des questions purement esthétiques. Si vous voulez signaler un arbre malade ou mort qui doit être enlevé selon vous, vous pouvez le faire en remplissant le formulaire en ligne. Le service des travaux publics enverra ensuite un arboriculteur certifié pour évaluer l'arbre et prendra des mesures en fonction du rapport de l'arboriculteur.
- 5. Bien sûr, nous sommes toujours heureux de savoir que vous aimeriez avoir un arbre public planté sur l'emprise municipale devant votre terrain. Faites une demande en ligne et les Travaux publics évalueront la faisabilité de votre demande.

NOUVEAU RÔLE D'ÉVALUATION FONCIÈRE

Un nouveau rôle d'évaluation foncière triennal a été déposé par la Direction de l'évaluation foncière de la Ville de Montréal (DEFVM) en septembre.

Le nouveau rôle entre en vigueur le le janvier 2020 et servira de base à vos comptes de taxes pour 2020, 2021 et 2022. Vous pouvez chercher la nouvelle évaluation de votre propriété en consultant le site web du DEFVM à https://beta.montreal.ca/demarches/consulter-le-role-devaluation-fonciere.

Lors de l'évaluation de la valeur d'une propriété donnée, la DEFVM tente de déterminer la valeur marchande de cette propriété au ler juillet 2018, à partir des ventes comparables dans le quartier. Des rénovations ou améliorations majeures à votre propriété augmenteront également l'évaluation.

L'augmentation moyenne de la valeur des propriétés résidentielles à Montréal-Ouest avec ce rôle a été de 16,8 %. Cela comprend les maisons unifamiliales (+19,1 %), les condos (+6,4 %), les immeubles de deux à cinq logements (+3,1 %) et les immeubles de six logements ou plus (+10,8 %). La hausse de la valeur des propriétés non résidentielles a été de 13,8 % et de 20,4 % pour les terrains vacants. Tous types de propriétés confondus, le rôle d'évaluation total a augmenté de 16,5 %.

Dans l'ensemble de l'île de Montréal, les évaluations ont augmenté en moyenne de 13,7 %. Parmi les 15 villes liées, l'augmentation moyenne de la valeur a été de 17,8 % pour l'ensemble des types de propriétés. Ces chiffres indiquent un marché immobilier vigoureux qui s'est intensifié considérablement depuis le dernier rôle d'évaluation de 2017, alors que ces mêmes villes affichaient des hausses moyennes d'une valeur de 3 %. C'est une excellente nouvelle et cela signifie que nous sommes tous plus riches, du moins sur papier!

Néanmoins, certains résidents ont exprimé des inquiétudes quant à l'incidence de l'augmentation de l'évaluation foncière sur leurs taxes foncières. Vous pouvez être assuré qu'une augmentation d'évaluation de 19 % ne signifie pas que votre taxe foncière augmentera du même montant. Vos taxes fon-

cières sont le résultat de deux facteurs : le taux par mille (le taux de taxe est approuvé par la Ville pour chaque 100 \$ d'évaluation) multiplié par votre évaluation. Lorsque les évaluations foncières augmentent considérablement, le taux de taxe peut être rajusté à la baisse pour aider à contrebalancer l'augmentation.

Conformément à notre Plan financier stratégique, le Conseil s'est fixé des objectifs et a été en mesure de maintenir les hausses de la taxe foncière à l'indice des prix à la consommation (IPC) pour la maison à prix moyen au cours des dernières années. Nous tenterons d'atteindre cet objectif encore une fois cette année. Toutefois, les propriétés dont l'augmentation d'évaluation est supérieure à la moyenne peuvent raisonnablement s'attendre à ce que l'augmentation de leur taxe foncière soit légèrement supérieure à celle de l'IPC. Les taux d'imposition réels ne seront connus qu'en décembre, après l'approbation du budget 2020. Si vous pensez que l'évaluation de votre propriété est incorrecte ou ne reflète pas la réalité, vous pouvez la contester en remplissant une "Demande de révision du rôle d'évaluation foncière" qui est disponible en ligne ou à l'hôtel de ville. Vous devez justifier votre demande et la faire parvenir à la DEFVM au plus tard le 30 avril 2020. N'oubliez pas que votre évaluation peut être augmentée, diminuée ou demeurer la même lorsque vous la contestez.

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Council meeting: September

With as many councillors as attendees present, **Mayor Masella** opened the September Council meeting with a few very

short remarks. He congratulated the Town merchants for all their hard work in making the Westminster Street Fair such a big success. He was also appreciative of the joint effort made between the merchants and the Town in order to hold this first-time event.

The Mayor then announced the planned arrival of the *CP Holiday Train* on November 26. This has been proven to be another very successful event in the Town.

First question period

An Easton resident was the only one to raise a question during the time allotted to the first question period. Because he has a very large lot he wants to take down his present building in order to build more than one residence on the property.

The Mayor clearly defined the procedure required to accomplish this goal. First, the Building Inspector would have to be consulted in order to apply for a demotion permit. This permit would then have to be approved by Council and, if approved, the future construction plans must be approved by PAC.

Councillor's reports

Councillor Mazzone explained that because of revisions to the law, it is now necessary for a resident to first inform the neighbour of a problem being caused by any overhanging branches of trees and request action. If no action is taken, the property owner can escalate the situation by legal means.

Councillor Mazzone described the communication process by which the Town can

alert and explain necessary measures to be taken by residents in the case of an emergency. This process was recently used to inform residents of the testing of safety measures being taken by *Parmalat*. Several fines have been handed out for garbage infractions as well as the illegal storage of construction material in a back yard. And rush-hour traffic was disrupted for about an hour due to a vehicle hitting one of the railroad barriers causing electrical damage which had to be repaired before the crossing reopened.

Councillor Ulin announced that fall programs are now in session as well as events using the rink. She emphasized the fact that some of the programs organized for young children are "bursting at the seams." Welcome baskets, with contributions from merchants and community organizations, have been distributed to new residents and two surveys are in the works. The one on satisfaction with this summer's pool activities, will be available shortly. The other will be a survey on environmental issues and will be available in November.

Work on the preparation of the Town's budget for 2020 is in progress and the information collected from water meter readings is being processed. This year, according to **Councillor Feeney**, 357 people sent in their readings by photograph.

A new property assessment roll for 2020-2022 has been released by the City of Montreal and the average increase for single family homes in MoWest is 19.1%. However, Council has set the objective of keeping property tax increases to the CPI for average-priced homes for several years and will attempt to continue this practice.

The infrastructure work on Wolseley is almost completed and Sheraton Park is in the process of being cleaned up were reassurances offered by **Councillor Torres**.

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She added that *Hydro-Québec* will be holding an open house information session on October 23 in the Town Hall to explain the creation of a "green corridor" (a portion of which will pass through MoWest). This initiative is part of a plan to upgrade their transmission system between LaSalle and Staint-Laurent.

Second question period

A Westminster South resident, concerned about possible damage occurring due to the large amount of infrastructure work being carried out in the Town, wondered if a scientific study could be obtained which would alleviate these concerns. The Mayor stated that the unprecedented amount of work being done was long overdue and, among other things, has reduced the number of water breaks in the Town. He further offered the reassurance that the Town is required, every three years, to provide an updated report that must be approved by the government, in order to obtain grants for the work.

The requirement to include a photo the water meter reading when using the online reporting form was questioned by another speaker. Councillor Feeney responded that a photo ensured accuracy of the reading.

The meeting was then adjourned.





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Réunion du Conseil : septembre

Devant autant de membres du Conseil que de citoyens dans la salle, le **maire Masella** a ouvert la réunion de septembre avec

quelques courts commentaires. Il a félicité les commerçants de leur bon travail pour faire de la foire commerciale de Westminster un tel succès. Il a aussi souligné la collaboration entre les commerçants et la Ville pour la tenue de ce premier événement.

Le maire a annoncé la venue du *Train des Fêtes du CP*, le 26 novembre. Cet événement s'est avéré un franc succès par le passé.

Première période de questions

Seul un résident d'Easton a soulevé une question pendant le temps alloué à cette première période de questions. Étant propriétaire d'un très grand terrain, il souhaite démolir le bâtiment actuel pour ériger plus d'une résidence sur la propriété.

Le maire a clairement énoncé la procédure à cette fin. D'abord, on doit consulter l'inspecteur en bâtiment pour demander un permis de démolition, lequel nécessitera l'approbation du Conseil; s'il y a ratification, le CCU devra ensuite approuver les plans des nouvelles constructions.

Rapports des membres du Conseil

Le **conseiller Mazzone** a expliqué qu'en raison d'amendements à la loi, il est dorénavant requis d'abord d'informer le voisin du problème causé par les branches d'arbres en surplomb et de lui demander correction. Si aucune action n'est entreprise, le propriétaire peut recourir à des moyens juridiques.

Le conseiller a décrit le processus de communication qu'utilise la Ville pour alerter ses citoyens et leur expliquer les mesures nécessaires à prendre en cas d'urgence. Ce moyen fut récemment utilisé pour informer les résidents du test de mesures de sécurité réalisé par Parmalat. Plusieurs amendes ont été imposées pour des infractions concernant les déchets ainsi que pour le stockage illégal de matériaux de construction dans une cour arrière. Finalement, la circulation en heure de pointe a été perturbée pendant environ une heure lorsqu'un véhicule a heurté les barrières du chemin de fer causant des dommages au système électrique qu'on a dû réparer avant la réouverture du passage à niveau.

La **conseillère Ulin** a annoncé que les activités d'automne ont débuté ainsi que celles de la patinoire. Elle a insisté sur le fait que certains programmes pour bambins sont pleins à craquer. Des paniers de bienvenue, avec contributions des commerçants et d'organismes communautaires, ont été distribués aux nouveaux résidents et deux sondages

sont en préparation. Un, disponible sous peu, visera la satisfaction des participants aux activités de la piscine l'été dernier et l'autre, portant sur des questions environnementales, sortira en novembre.

Les travaux préparatoires pour le budget 2020 de la Ville vont bon train et les données de lecture des compteurs d'eau sont en traitement. Cette année, selon la conseillère Feeney, 357 personnes ont transmis des photos de leurs compteurs.

La Ville de Montréal a déposé un nouveau rôle d'évaluation foncière pour 2020-2022 qui comporte une augmentation moyenne pour les maisons unifamiliales à Mo-Ouest de 19,1 %. Cependant, depuis plusieurs années, le Conseil a établi l'objectif de limiter la hausse des taxes foncières au niveau de l'IPC pour la maison de prix moyen et s'efforcera de continuer cette pratique.

Les travaux d'infrastructure sur Wolseley sont presque terminés et le parc Sheraton est en voie d'être nettoyé. Voilà les assurances qu'a offertes la **conseillère Torres**.

Elle a ajouté qu'*Hydro-Québec* tiendra une séance d'information le 23 octobre à l'hôtel de ville, pour expliquer la création d'un «corridor vert» qui passera par Mo-Ouest. Cette initiative s'inscrit dans le cadre d'un projet de modernisation de son système de transmission entre LaSalle et Saint-Laurent.

Seconde période de questions

Une résidente de Westminster Sud préoccupée par la possibilité de dommages en raison du grand nombre de travaux d'infrastructure dans la ville, se demandait si une étude scientifique pourrait être obtenue afin de calmer ces appréhensions. Le maire a indiqué que le nombre sans précédent de travaux aurait dû être réalisé depuis longtemps et a, entre autres, réduit le nombre de bris d'aqueduc. De plus, il l'a assurée que la Ville doit produire un rapport à jour tous les trois ans, lequel doit recevoir l'aval du gouvernement afin d'obtenir des subventions pour ces travaux.

Une autre intervenante a remis en question l'obligation d'inclure une photo du compteur d'eau pour utiliser le formulaire de rapport en ligne. La conseillère Feeney a répondu qu'une photo garantissait l'exactitude de la lecture.

La séance fut ensuite levée.


