#### 7. <u>Councillors' Reports</u>

#### a) Seat Number 1

Councillor Lauren Pennefather reported on matters pertaining to Public Security and Urban Planning (2).

#### b) Seat Number 2

Councillor Elizabeth Ulin reported on matters pertaining to Public Works, Communications and Environment (1).

#### c) Seat Number 3

Councillor Colleen Feeney reported on matters pertaining to Finance, Recreation and topics related to the status of Age Friendly Municipality.

#### d) Seat Number 4

In the absence of Councillor Maria Torres, there was no report on matters pertaining to Urban Planning (1) and Environment (2).

#### 8. First Public Question Period

The Mayor announced the beginning of the First Public Question Period at 8:21 p.m.

Given the circumstances, residents had been invited to submit in advance their questions concerning matters of general interest to the Mayor and Councillors.

# 1. Sondra Sherman

Said that since her street was re-paved, every time it rains there is a large puddle in front of the driveway between the sidewalk and the street. Asked the Town to fix it.

#### 2. Mark Lehberg

Said that whenever it snows, he cannot park on the street, not just for the day that it is cleaned but for the entire week of the removal operation. It was not like that before the last few years. Wanted to know what has changed.

# 3. Nicholas Curtis

Noticed that every morning and evening, his driveway and the sidewalk are used as a thoroughfare to get onto Easton south of Broughton. This cannot be tolerated and he asked Council to look into erecting offsetting metal posts that will allow pedestrian traffic but deter driving on the sidewalk.

#### 4. Howard Barza

Even though he understood that much of the very substantial tax increase is attributable to the inequitable downloading of taxes from the agglomeration council, asked if any portion is also attributable to the new recreation center project.

#### 5. Valmar Kurol

Given the fact that attempts at polite negotiations with Montreal over Agglomeration tax structures have not gone anywhere, asked if Montreal West would consider joining any other municipality, like Beaconsfield, in order to pursue legal action and have a court review the issue.

#### 6. Karen Donnelly

Considering that the City of Montreal has banned wood-burning home appliances, except EPA certified ones, and that other municipalities on the island have by-laws that ban fireplace and wood stove use during smog alerts, wanted to know why Montreal West has not acted on this important issue.

#### 7. Domenica Pulcini

Wanted to know why there is no longer an indication of bike path on Ronald Drive. Also said that Ronald Drive has become a service road due to the construction on Brock, where traffic is seriously overloaded, and asked for help to keep the street safer.

#### 8. Susan Elgie

Said that it would be a great advantage to pedestrians if the sidewalks at each end of the crosswalks and the adjoining roadway at Westminster and Milner could be linked, so that they would not step into 6 inches of slush when crossing Westminster.

#### 9. Peter McLean

Asked when the mailbox on Nelson and Westminster on the sidewalk is going to be repaired, and if something will be done about the bicycles on the sidewalk come spring.

#### 10. Georges Lanmafankpotin

Concerning a vacant piece of land between 191 and 255 Brock South, wanted to know what the Town is planning to do with it.

#### 11. Louise Chenevert

Knowing that, in 2019, dye tests were done in the north end of Montreal West, asked what percentage of the area was assessed, and how many cross connections were discovered.

#### 12. Louise Chenevert

Since there was work done on the sewer systems under Toe Blake Park and in the surrounding streets (Sheraton, Crestwood, Banstead), asked what percentage of the cross connections discovered were corrected, how much did it cost, and if the Town's share of the problem has been settled.

#### 13. Ellen Moore

Asked why the Adult Library cannot find a place in the new recreation center. Also asked the Town to find other solutions than salt in clearing streets and sidewalks of snow.
