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# CONTEXT

The Town plans to develop a single, modern center of sports and recreational services where citizens of all ages can engage in meaningful, accessible sports and recreation experiences that foster individual and community wellbeing, in a sustainable approach.

Montreal West recognizes that sports and recreation activities must reflect community interests and needs. As such, a survey conducted in 2015 asking the population if they agreed to the reconstruction of the facilities showed citizen support for the project. In May 2021, the Town was pleased to announce that it received a grant of \$ 12.5 M from the federal and provincial governments as part of the <u>Financial</u> <u>Assistance Program for Recreational and Sports Infrastructures</u> (PAFIRS) for the reconstruction of its Sports and Recreation Center.

This grant officially kickstarted the new Sports and Recreation Center project.

The public consultations are part of the Town's ongoing efforts to improve its consultative mechanism to encourage citizens to participate in important decisions related to the development of their community.



# SCOPE OF THE CONSULTATIONS


The overall principle of the consultations was to help the Town identify the interior space and layout needs required for its programs, to reflect on the sports and recreation programs that are offered and to identify potential related uses.

The goal of the consultations wasn't to address technical architectural or engineering elements. In November 2021, Montreal West awarded a mandate to the Consortium Blouin Tardif Architectes | Coarchitecture Architectes and their multi-disciplinary team to handle this aspect of the project. The Planning Advisory Comittee reviewed the preliminary plans and provided recommendations.


# **CONSULTATION FORMAT**

The consultation was held virtually via Zoom and was facilitated by Hugo Mimée, a professional facilitator. The event began with a presentation by the Mayor of the plans for the new Sports and Recreation Center and was followed by a question period. The next part of the event was devoted to three workshops during which participants were divided into smaller groups to share their thoughts and opinions on certain topics.

# PARTICIPANT INFORMATION

These consultation activities were open to all Montreal West residents and were advertised on the Town website, in The Informer and by e-bulletin. Those interested to participate were asked to register on the Town website. A total of 88 residents registered and all were invited to one of two events.


In the end, 48 residents attended the virtual consultation activities.

# Participants were also asked what type of classes they thought might be missing and would like the Town to offer in the new center.

- Art classes (i.e painting, pottery, drawing, etc.
- Activities for teens (i.e. hip hop, weight lifting, rock climbing, etc.)
- Dance classes
- High intensity classes for adults (i.e. aerobics, power yoga, etc.)
- Life courses (i.e. cooking classes, CPR, computer classes, etc.)
- Parent & Tot classes

- Tai chi
- Weight lifting

Plans for the new center include a gymnasium that could be used for sports such as badminton, mini-tennis, pickleball, dodgeball and more. Participants were asked about the kind of activities they'd like to practice in the gym.

# FACILITIES



# **CONSULTATION DETAILS**

Local community organizations that serve the Montreal West community were invited to form a Montreal West Round table to come together, discuss and identify information that is important to share with the Town. Each organization nominated a representative to attend the meeting.

The first meeting fell under the Town's public consultation process for the new Sports and Recreation Center.

The consultation was held virtually via Zoom and was chaired by Mayor Beny Masella. It began with a presentation of the plans for the new Sports and Recreation Center and was followed by a question period and an open discussion between attendees.

# Participants were asked if they had reflected on ways in which their community groups might use the facilities.

#### Rentals of the gym, multipurpose rooms and rink

- Some groups have currently been holding their meetings in church basements but would like to move away from using religious buildings and would be interested in renting space at the new center
- Some previous partnerships with school gyms have been stopped because of COVID regulations
- Suggested rental uses: meetings, youth programs, bike program, therapy sessions (occupational and physical), fundraisers, speakers, screenings, etc.
- Interest in renting ice time for skating lessons for kids all year long
- Rental policy is being developped

#### Use of the building


- · Little Red wants to continue using the pool for their summer camps
- Use of the bathrooms and changing rooms in the new center by the Tennis Club members

#### Storage

• Some groups inquired about possible storage space in the new center for their equipment

# General comments and suggestions made by participants during the discussion.

- Need to have good ventilation with the appropriate post-COVID standards
- Accessibility is extremely important. Has to be available as well as accessible (i.e. ramps that are maintained and cleared in the winter months)
- Updated technological equipment in the multipurpose rooms (projector and screens)
- · Walking track outside would need to be flat and safe and properly maintained
- Handicapped parking included in the lot
- Elevator
- Safety and security issues at night when they cross back and forth between the center and the tennis courts.
- Traffic and parking: have to keep in mind that Public Works building is right next door with its usual amount of traffic
- Ease of use: tables and chairs close by that are lightweight and easily accessible, plug and play technology.
- At some point, it would be nice for all groups to post their rental options in one spot
- Pickleball requires a specific court with special lines

# **CONSULTATION FORMAT**


The survey was broken down into 4 sections:

Visuals of the preliminary concepts were also presented in the survey.


# **PARTICIPANT INFORMATION**

# SPORTS AND RECREATION PROGRAMS

The Town is looking for ways to improve its future programming. As such, respondents were asked to identify the main reasons they are not participating in the Town's sports and recreation activities. These are:


1.Schedule (35%) 2.Variety of courses (30%) 3.Quality of facilities (22%) 4.Cost (8%)

Several suggestions for new courses were highlighted during the public consultations held in April. Respondents were asked to rank a list of suggested courses in order of interest. Here are the results.



# The new center includes plans for a gymnasium. Respondents were asked about their interest in participating in certain drop-in activities in the gym.

Badminton was a clear favourite with pickleball following in second place.

Then came volleyball, indoor soccer, basketball, mini-tennis and ball hockey.

# UNIVERSAL ACCESSIBILITY

The new building will ensure facilities are barrier free by design. Sample measures considered by the Town to ensure accessibility to all were presented to respondents. They were then asked for suggestions for other initiatives that would allow an active participation and access for all.

Only suggestions relating to universal accessibility are included in the report.

### FACILITIES



# QUESTIONS ASKED DURING THE CONSULTATIONS

### **TRAFFIC AND PARKING**

#### Have estimates regarding the increase in traffic been done?

Full traffic studies will be done to see traffic and parking impacts on Bedbrook and on neighbouring streets.

#### Will parking be increased?

We are increasing the number of parking spots to accomodate the bigger demand for parking. We have also removed the perpendicular parking on Bedbrook and have replaced it with off-street parking and on-street parallel parking.

#### Will there be a drop off area?

Yes, there will be a drop off area by the front door.

#### Will there be parking spots for individuals with limited mobility?

Yes, there will be multiple spots reserved for those with limited mobility close to the entrance.

#### VARIA

#### What is the financial structure of this project?

The Town has secured government funding worth 12.5 M\$ and is working on a fundraising campaign to limit the fiscal impact of the project on citizens while ensuring quality infrastructure for decades to come.

#### Why isn't the library included in the plans for the new center?

The Town of Montreal West received a grant of \$12.5 M from the federal and provincial governments as part of the Financial Assistance Program for Recreational and Sports Infrastructures (PAFIRS) for the reconstruction of its Sports and Recreation Center. The grant is strictly reserved to sports and recreation and does not allow for the inclusion of a Library which is categorized as culture. Though the Montreal West Public Library is not part of the new project, the Town has worked extremely hard with its board to secure alternate permanent accessible locations to meet its members' needs.

#### What sustainable components are included in the plans for the new center?

The Town is focusing on energy–efficient installations, responsible management of potable water and good thermal control systems. A bio–retention basin for stormwater and an exterior green wall and a white roof are also being considered. Part of the design requirement was to save as much green space as possible. The heat that will be extracted by making ice for the rink will be used to warm up parts of the pool.

## **POOL AREA**

#### Will there be an indoor pool?

Unfortunately, we could not fit all the desired uses into it due to financial constraints for the construction and future operation of the infrastructure. We are working on expanding our agreements with neighbouring towns and boroughs so that our citizens can enjoy their indoor pools.

#### Will there be a diving area?

The pool will have a deep end with a diving board.

#### Are there outdoor showers at the pool?

The plans include outdoor showers. There will also be a separate pool annex with bathrooms and changing rooms allowing for quick and easy access to swimmers.

# ACTIVITIES

# Will the preliminary timeline allow for use of the pool and/or rink during the demolition and construction phase?

The timeline is preliminary at this stage and it is impossible to say exactly how many seasons will be missed during the work. This information will be defined more precisely when the construction contract will be awarded.

#### Where will Town activities be relocated during the construction phase?

At this stage, it is impossible to predict the extent of the construction site which will be secured and inaccessible for security reasons. It should be noted that it is very likely that Hodgson Field will not be accessible due to the need to store materials and equipment for the construction site. During the construction phase, the priority will be the safety of the citizens.

Town programs will continue to be offered at Town Hall, the Community Center and the Curling Club. The Town is looking into agreements with neighbouring towns and boroughs for access to the pool while it's closed. Day camp will continue to be offered but the exact location will be confirmed at a later date. CRA is looking into different partnerships with neighbouring rinks and fields.

#### Will the day camp use the multipurpose rooms instead of the trailers they usually use?

Yes, we should now have enough indoor space for camp.

#### What is happening to the existing Community Center on Westminster?

The building will continue to house certain activities for the moment and the idea is for most activities to be moved to the new Center when it's open to the public.

## FACILITIES

#### What's the concept of the café-restaurant? Will it be operated by the Town?

We are looking at a full service cafeteria offering healthy options with places to sit. The Town will not be operating the restaurant.

#### Will the gym have movable walls?

Both the multipurpose rooms and the gymnasium will have movable walls.

#### Will there be a weight room?

The plans for the new center do not include a weight room.

#### What's a pro shop?

A pro shop is a small shop on site that sells basic hockey equipment and sharpens skates.

### **COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS**

#### Will there be storage space for the community organizations inside the building?

We don't have an answer for this yet but we might not have space to offer all community organizations some storage space.

#### What will the rental charge be?

In order for the project to be financially viable, we are working on a rental policy. More details will be made available in due time.

### SECOND PHASE

#### Do plans include a dog park?

Plans for a dog park are not part of phase 1 of the project but could be considered in a subsequent phase.

#### Will the basketball court be moved?

The basketball court is planned for the second phase of the work. It will definitely not be closer to residents on Fairfield, but it might not be much further than it currently is. There will be many more trees planted along Hodgson Field close to the backyards to act as a buffer.

#### Will the soccer field be astroturf or natural turf?

This will be confirmed in a subsequent phase but the Town is leaning towards natural at the moment in an effort to preserve green space,
