## MoWest's libraries score 97% on BiblioQualité 2023

Started a couple of years ago, the program BiblioQualité is a provincial evaluation of the public libraries in Québec, organised by the Association des bibliothèques publiques de Québec (The Quebec Public Libraries Association).

The libraries of Montreal West – the Public Library and the Children's Library obtained a total score of 97% for the year 2023 – based on statistics from 2022.

Five indicators are being used in this exercise: opening hours, physical space, sitting space, human resources and expenses for acquisitions. The libraries are awarded bonus points for abolishing late fees and for offering their services to residents for free.

If you are interested in consulting the detailed report, you can visit either library and request it.

Friday, September 29, our Rotary Club's speaker was **Norbert Bedoucha**, Treasurer of the *Montreal West Merchants Association*.

Long-time resident of MoWest and Certified Residential and Commercial Real Estate Broker, Norbert spoke about

community support and economic development as a collaborative symphony and interactive dance. Businesses transform communities.

#### Environmentalism in action

## **Leave the leaves!**



Although the first few weeks of autumn felt more like summer than July did, chilly days and bright, co-

loured leaves are among us. Throughout the past few weeks, the trees began to shed their leaves, leaving crunchy masses of orange and reds beneath our feet. Though many may be thrilled about the fall festivities and pretty colours, the hassle of maintaining a leaf-free lawn can be overwhelming.

Blowing, raking and chopping dead plant material in your garden can be quite tedious and time consuming and can cause even more stress to our environment than it does to our backs! In the natural world, autumn is preparation time, a time to collect enough food, conserve enough energy or to find a suitable shelter to last through our long Canadian winter.

Although some animals may have the fur and food supply to thrive in the snow, our smaller insect friends don't have that luxury. Instead, pollinators and other types of insects enter a process similar to hibernation called diapause. During this period, insects will pause their development as eggs, larvae, pupae or even adults and enter a type of long sleep, allowing them to save energy

to make it to the spring. In order to successfully begin diapause, insects require a stable environment, capable of protecting them from the elements and predators. The dense cover of fallen leaves that litter your lawn offers just that: a safe environment, lasting just long enough to enter diapause for the winter. As well as offering protection to our small critters, and requiring less housework, leaving leaves and other plant material on our property also provide a natural mulch which helps supress weeds and fertilizes your garden as they break down! Seems like a win-win!

So what can you do? Leave the leaves! (or at least part of them). Although leaving the leaves as they are is most commonly known as the best option, having multiple trees or even a very large leafy tree may complicate your situation. Living in a city neighbourhood like Montreal West, our gardens and lawns don't have as developed a microbiome as our forests do, meaning it may be harder for immense quantities of leaves to decompose properly. In order to solve that issue, some decide to pick up only a portion or resort to the lawn mower to mulch the leaves and speed up the breakdown process. Others who still strive to have a tidy lawn, resort to raking their leaves and dead plant material into flowerbeds instead! Although these alternatives may not seem that useful to our pollinators, studies show that the presence of leaf litter and dead plant material will always have a positive effect on our ecosystem regardless of their texture, location or quantity. So regardless of your situation or whatever method you decide to do, just know that every LITTER bit counts.

Can the multi-award-winning author Kazuo Ishiguro ever write an indifferent novel? The answer is clearly no. His latest book, Klara and the Sun about a dystopian



future world where AI companions are a normal part of every child's life, earned him the Nobel Prize in Literature. Add to this a Booker Prize for Remains of the Day and various awards for other works as well as numerous state and na481-7522

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tional orders, Ishiguro is perhaps one of the most prominent novelists today.

As AI becomes an increasingly larger and more visible part of our lives, Klara and the Sun asks the question of whether robots can be trained to seamlessly replicate and replace us. Klara is an AI friend to Josie, a young teenager with a mysterious illness that may take her life. "So you see what's being asked of you Klara," says the man who believes he can scientifically prove that replication is possible. "You're not being required simply to mimic Josie's outward behaviour. You're being asked to continue her for... everyone who loves Josie.... There's nothing inside Josie that's beyond the Klaras of this world to continue," he explains to Josie's mother. Or, as Josie's best friend asks, is there something inside of us, something so unique that we are in fact truly irreplaceable. "Let me ask you something...." Do you believe in the human heart? Something that makes each of us individual and special?"

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
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
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#### Scouts

## National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

During the unit meeting closest to September 30 National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, all the units held meetings which were themed on this topic. The leaders were all very impressed to know how much the girls already knew about this important day. They were keen to participate in the activities. The Sparks and Embers joined in, which helped them share their feelings about how the indigenous people were treated. They listened to stories written

by native authors about their experiences. The girls also crafted origami orange T-shirts and on the back they wrote what special talents or skills they have. Many of the traditional First Nations cultures teach that everyone has a special talent or skill they are born with. We wanted the girls to appreciate this important value.

The Guides had a guest speaker who spoke of her mother's experience as a residential school survivor. Her mother was born into the Ojibwe tribe. It was moving to learn what she endured.

## Day camp at Wa-Thik-Ane

At the end of September, the Guides, Pathfinders and Rangers enjoyed a day camp at Wa-Thik-Ane. It was called the GPR Challenge Day. The girls were up bright and early to board buses from all across the province. On the MoWest bus,

there were girls from Châteauguay, Verdun as well as NDG. Making new friends started on the bus for us! Once at the camp, the girls had an opportunity to participate in various program activities and interact with the different groups. At each site, there were many activities from the Girl's First Platform (where all the requirements to earn the different badges are found) to creating positive notes which will be posted in the bathrooms of the different sites come the spring. They practised properly sorting "garbage" into different piles. Not everything is thrown out because there is composting and recycling to consider. They participated in a conflict resolution game, hiked around the camp, enjoyed the Fairy Forest and the fall colours. The sites at Wa-Thik-Ane are named after different First Nations cultures. The girls found, on an indigenous map of North America, where these different cultures traditionally lived. The official day camp ended with everyone participating in a campfire. When the time came for the various buses to leave with the younger girls and their leaders, the buses returned them to their various corners of the province.

### Rangers

The Rangers were invited to camp overnight. The Rangers from our area jumped at the chance to spend additional time there. The weather was so cooperative, they slept under the stars! They decided they wanted

to do a sunrise hike to the bluff, so they were up extra early, hiking in the dark and watching the sunrise over the fall foliage. A perfect way to start the day! The girls planned their menu and cooked everything for themselves and their leaders. They cleaned up after themselves and ensured they were ready before the designated pick-up time. They have come away with memories which will last them a lifetime.

A very nice aspect of day camp is the opportunity it affords girls who are new to Guiding to experience what a camp would be like without the need for a lot of additional equipment. For those who enjoy the camp and have been there many times, it gives them a chance to reconnect with others they have camped with and with nature. It is one of the highlights of the Guiding year.



## What are the different hockey levels and how do they work?

Below is a general overview of the different levels of hockey in Quebec. At the Peewee, Bantam, and Midget levels, players may be divided into different skill levels: AAA (the highest), AA (mid-level), and A (lower level). This allows for more balanced competition and helps in the development of players at their respective skill levels.

## Minor Hockey Associations (MWH Knights)

Initiation program: Peewee, Bantam and Midget. This level is typically for young children who are just starting to play hockey. It focuses on developing basic skills, introducing the rules of the game and fostering a love of the sport.

Single Letter (A-B-C) M9 to M18: These are age-specific categories that continue to build on fundamental skills. The emphasis is on player development, and competition is generally less intense at these levels.

We play against teams within our region and at the end of the year, if one of our teams wins the regional championships, they go to the provincial championships.


#### Triple letters AAA

#### M18AA



Midget AAA hockey in Quebec, as in other provinces, serves as a crucial development stage for young players who aspire to play at higher levels, such as major junior hockey, college hockey or even professionally. It provides a more advanced and competitive environment for skill development and exposure to scouts and recruiters. The level of competition at the midget AAA level is typically high, and players often aim to perform well to enhance their prospects for future opportunities in the sport.

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

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### Town Council meeting: September

MONTREAL WEST

In the absence of the mayor, **Councillor Torres** chaired the meeting. She read a report from

the mayor apologizing for the need to reschedule the September meeting and for his absence tonight. Airline and family issues caused the problems.

A meeting with residents on Bedbrook took place to bring them up to date on the construction happening across the street from their homes.

The provincial government has decided to accelerate the way they will send the grant money. They will pay the full amount a year after the project is completed instead of disbursing it over ten years.

Raffaelle Di Stasio was welcomed back from her maternity leave and Valentina Todoran was thanked for the considerable amount of extra work she took on during the absence.

#### Councillors' reports

Councillor Torres reminded residents of the importance of always obtaining a permit for work they intend to do. She explained that to get information concerning the need for a permit, too many people are relying on their neighbours or calling her for answers. In order to get completely accurate information, it is essential to direct any questions to the Town's Planning Department.

Councillor Small-Pennefather reported a number of events which took place in the Town over the past month. Police are investigating an altercation between two groups of youths, that took place on Broughton during which shots were fired. A suspiciouslooking bag, containing passports, ID cards and some witchcraft books was discovered and a backpack was stolen from the Town

Hall. One individual has been arrested and residents are warned to report any suspicious activity they may observe to the police.

Only electric- or battery-operated leaf blowers will be permitted to be used between November 1 and 31 and the work must be performed during the regulated hours. Fines for noncompliance are stiff for both residents and contractors.

Roads, sidewalks, trees and public gardens are all getting attention from Public works staff according to **Councillor Ulin**. The *Environmental Action Committee* is working on a variety of projects including a review of the wood-burning regulations, better waste management policies and the potential for bike routes within the territory.

The news that water tax bills will be sent out on October 31 was the first item on **Councillor Feeney**'s report. In her usual review of the Town's expenditure during the past month, she noted that there was an item of \$20,000 that was used for reimbursement of property taxes according to the results of some re-evaluations.

Many fundraising events for the new recreation centre as well as the traditional activities for Halloween, Remembrance Day and Christmas are already scheduled. The information meeting for residents of Bedbrook was well attended and these meetings will continue as progress continues.

Seniors will be enjoying trips to a cranberry farm and to the Botanical Garden to wander through the Japanese and First Nations gardens illuminated at night.

A *MADA* consultation meeting will be held in October to review progress and consider further action.

#### First question period

Traffic concerns are always a feature of the question period and this time several residents living on Westover described problems in their area. It is felt that there are not enough deterrents to stop the speeding and dangerous driving of many of the cars using that street and that Sunnybrooke is being used as a passageway to Westminster. In addition, the red flashing light at the corner of Westminster is missing adding, to the problems. It was reported that some residents living here often feel "forgotten" by the rest of the Town and left to deal with problems on their own. The junctures of Westover, Westminster and Brock North were also pointed out as continuing problems and a stop sign was asked for in this area.

Councillor Small-Pennefather agreed that the issue of missing light has been reported before and, although the light actually belongs to Côte Saint-Luc, efforts will be made to have it reinstated.

She explained that a traffic study has already been undertaken in this area and the results will determine what may be done in order to improve the situation.

In reply to another question, **Councillor Feeney** explained that she cannot say what the interest rate will be for the Town's loan since it hasn't made use of the loan yet. When the need occurs, in the new year, the rate will be made public.

Crime preventive measures, alternatives to the use of disposable cups used at events in the Town Hall and continued pleas for an alternative winter dog run were additional issues presented to Council.

While crime seems to be on the increase across the country, the PSOs are always on the alert and residents have been encouraged to report anything suspicions. Councillor Ulin agreed that making use of non-disposable drinking utensils is a good idea and may be considered. There has been no change in the allocation of dog runs after the long and considerable effort that went into establishing the current one.

The agenda then turned to Other Business which included Notice of Motion, reading and adoption of a number of bylaws.

The last comment during this question period came from a resident who expressed great appreciation as well as a lot of admiration for the Public Works staff who recently continued to patch potholes and cracks on Strathearn North in spite of sweltering temperatures on the hottest day in September.



A question was asked if the names of the Town's various providers or suppliers could be available. The answer was yes, this information can be found on the Town's website or by contacting the Town Clerk.

The meeting was then adjourned.



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### Réunions du Conseil : septembre

En l'absence du maire, la conseillère Torres a présidé la réunion. Elle a lu un rapport du maire s'ex-

cusant de la nécessité de reporter la réunion de septembre et de son absence ce soir. Des problèmes de compagnies aériennes et de famille ont causé les soucis.

Une réunion avec les résidents de Bedbrook a eu lieu pour les informer des travaux de construction en cours de l'autre côté de la rue.

Le gouvernement provincial a décidé d'accélérer la façon dont il enverra l'argent de la subvention. Le montant total sera payé un an après la fin du projet plutôt que déboursé sur dix ans.

Raffaelle Di Stasio a été accueillie de nouveau après son congé de maternité et Valentina Todoran a été remerciée pour le travail supplémentaire considérable qu'elle a accompli pendant son absence.

#### Rapports des membres du Conseil

La conseillère Torres a rappelé aux résidents l'importance de toujours obtenir un permis pour les travaux qu'ils souhaitent effectuer. Elle a expliqué que pour obtenir des informations sur le besoin d'un permis, trop de personnes se fient aux voisins ou l'appellent pour obtenir des réponses. Afin d'obtenir des informations justes, il est essentiel de diriger toute question au service de l'Urbanisme de la Ville.

La conseillère Small-Pennefather a fait état d'un certain nombre d'événements qui se sont produits dans la ville au cours du dernier mois. Les policiers enquêtent sur une altercation entre deux groupes de jeunes sur Broughton et au cours de laquelle on a tiré des coups de feu. Un sac suspect, contenant des passeports, des cartes d'identité et des livres de sorcellerie, a été découvert et un sac à dos a été volé à la mairie. Une personne a été arrêtée et les résidents sont incités à signaler à la police toute activité suspecte qu'ils pourraient observer.

Seules les souffleuses à feuilles électriques ou à piles pourront être utilisées entre le 1er et le 31 novembre, et les travaux devront être effectués aux heures réglementaires. Les amendes pour non-conformité sont lourdes tant pour les résidents que pour les entrepreneurs.

Les routes, les trottoirs, les arbres et les jardins publics retiennent tous l'attention du personnel des Travaux publics, selon la **conseillère Ulin**. Le Comité d'action pour l'environnement travaille sur divers projets, notamment un examen de la réglementation sur la combustion du bois, de meilleures politiques de gestion des déchets et du potentiel de pistes cyclables sur le territoire.

La nouvelle que les factures de la taxe sur l'eau seront envoyées le 31 octobre était le premier élément du rapport de la **conseillère Feeney**. Dans sa revue habituelle des dépenses de la Ville au cours du mois précédent, elle a noté qu'un poste de 20 000 \$ avait été utilisé pour le remboursement de taxes foncières par suite de certaines réévaluations.

De nombreuses activités de financement pour le nouveau centre récréatif ainsi que les activités traditionnelles pour l'Halloween, le jour du Souvenir et Noël sont déjà prévues. La réunion d'information à l'intention des résidents de Bedbrook a attiré de nombreux participants et ces rencontres se reproduiront au fur et à mesure de l'avancement des travaux.

Les aînés profiteront d'une visite à une ferme de canneberges ainsi qu'au Jardin botanique pour se promener dans les jardins japonais et des Premières Nations qui seront illuminés la nuit.

Une réunion de consultation *MADA* aura lieu en octobre pour examiner les progrès réalisés et examiner d'autres questions

#### Première période de questions

Les questions de circulation sont une caractéristique permanente de la période des questions et, cette fois-ci, plusieurs résidents de Westover ont décrit des problèmes dans leur secteur. On estime qu'il n'y a pas suffisamment de moyens de dissuasion pour empêcher la conduite dangereuse à grande vitesse de nombreux véhicules empruntant cette rue, et que Sunnybrooke sert de raccourci vers Westminster. De plus, l'absence du feu rouge clignotant à l'intersection Westminster aggrave la situation. Il a été rapporté que certains résidents vivant ici se sentent souvent «oubliés» par la Ville et laissés à eux-mêmes pour faire face aux problèmes. Les carrefours de Westover. Westminster et Brock Nord ont également été signalés comme des problèmes persistants et un panneau d'arrêt a été demandé dans ce secteur.

La conseillère Small-Pennefather a convenu que la question du feu manquant a déjà été signalée et que, même s'il relève en fait de Côte Saint-Luc, des efforts seront déployés pour le rétablir.

Elle a expliqué qu'une étude de la circulation a déjà été entreprise dans ce domaine et que les résultats détermineront ce qui peut être fait pour améliorer la situation.

En réponse à une autre question, la conseillère Feeney a expliqué qu'elle ne peut dire quel sera le taux d'intérêt pour l'emprunt de la Ville, puisque celle-ci ne l'a pas encore utilisé. Lorsque le besoin se fera sentir, au cours de la nouvelle année, le taux sera rendu public.

Des mesures de prévention du crime, des

solutions de rechange à l'utilisation de contenants jetables utilisés lors d'événements tenus à l'hôtel de ville et des plaidoyers continus en faveur d'un autre parc pour chiens hivernal ont été présentés au Conseil.

Alors que la criminalité semble être en hausse dans tout le pays, les ASP sont toujours sur le qui-vive et l'on encourage les résidents à signaler tout soupçon. La conseillère Ulin a convenu que l'utilisation de verres non jetables est une bonne idée et peut être envisagée. Il n'y a pas eu de changement à la situation du parc canin après les efforts longs et considérables qui ont été déployés pour établir le parc actuel.

Le dernier commentaire de cette période de questions a été celui d'un résident qui a exprimé sa reconnaissance et son admiration à l'égard du personnel de Travaux publics qui, récemment, a continué à colmater les nids-de-poule et les fissures sur Strathearn Nord malgré la température étouffante de la journée la plus chaude de septembre.

L'ordre du jour est ensuite passé à la rubrique Autres affaires, qui comprend les avis de motion, la lecture et l'adoption d'un certain nombre de règlements.

#### Seconde période de questions

On a demandé si les noms des divers fournisseurs de la Ville étaient disponibles. La réponse était oui, cette information se trouve sur le site Web de la Ville ou en communiquant avec le greffier.

La séance fut ensuite levée.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF THE URBAN PLANNING BY-LAWS AMENDMENTS, OCTOBER 2, 2023



During the last General Council meeting, the Town adopted four new by-laws amending the following Urban Planning by-laws. Please note that a notice of motion was given during a previous Council meeting.

## By-law concerning the sanitation and maintenance of dwellings

This by-law states that if a dwelling is in a state of obsolescence or dilapidation, the Town may require it to be repaired or maintained. It subsequently describes the process that the Town must follow to request the owner of such property to perform the necessary work. In addition, the amended by-laws now include the main and accessory building, without distinction of its use.

# By-law concerning the installation of mechanical equipment (heating, ventilation, cooling equipment, solar collector, heat pump or generator) on the exterior of a property

This by-law states that for a property owner to install any mechanical equipment on the exterior of their property a permit is now required.

#### By-law concerning the demolition of an immovable

This by-law expands the conditions and process required to obtain a demolition permit. It states the consequences (which in some cases can be quite severe) of demolishing a property without the required permit. Special mention is given to properties with heritage values. (Cultural Heritage Act, Chapter P-9.002).

#### By-law relating to tariffs

As the title of this by-law indicates, various tariffs were updated. Those tariffs are related to permits given for the use of the public domain, temporarily or on a permanent basis; for an authorization for intervention work (telecommunication, infrastructure, etc.); and for the permit to install exterior mechanical equipment.

#### **RECREATION CENTRE UPDATE**

If you haven't taken a stroll up Bedbrook recently, I recommend you do so. The old arena, pool and chalet have all been demolished in less than a month. According to residents on the street, they feel the demolition process went smoothly. As these are the residents who will be most impacted during the demolition-construction phase, the Director General and I met with them recently to listen to their concerns and provide support. Some of their issues were of a more general nature, and worth sharing with residents at large.

#### **Deconstruction/decontamination:**

Air quality was monitored during the demolition process, and safety equipment was worn by the workers. The waste debris was sorted and brought to the disposal site for contaminated materials recognized by the Minister of the Environment.

#### Traffic:

We will speak to the contractor to ensure that the trucks make full stops at stop signs, respect the speed limit in the town and slow down when approaching speed bumps to avoid excessive noise and vibrations for the surrounding houses.

#### Work timetable:

Normally, work will be conducted between the permissible hours in the town, i.e. 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. during the week, with shorter hours on the weekend if required.

The Town has pledged to meet with these residents again to keep them up-to-date with work timetables and respond to their questions.

Now we move onto the next phase of the project, which will start with the building of a foundation for the new sports and recreation centre.

#### **Fundraising:**

We are also moving on to the next phase of fundraising. The Recreation Department has held several fundraisers for the new centre and will continue to do so throughout the project. Coming fundraising events include the Halloween Spooktacular event, the Rock n' Roll dance party, and Breakfast with Santa. We encourage you to attend these events

to show your support. This is a win-win situation, as not only are you helping defray future costs, but the events themselves are loads of fun and a chance to meet and mix with neighbours.

Another win-win operation is about to launch. This is the public fundraising campaign. As previously reported, the first phase of the fundraising was led by Scott MacKenzie and his team, and involved major donations from corporations, foundations and individuals. This proved to be very successful, with over \$2 million raised to date.

The next phase is geared to the general public – residents and users of the new sports and recreation centre. A committee led by resident Derek Elliott will be sending out information shortly, informing residents about interesting naming opportunities and how they can help. All donations are tax deductible. And all monies raised will result in less money the Town has to borrow to pay for this new infrastructure. ### FAITS SAILLANTS DES MODIFICATIONS DES RÈGLEMENTS D'URBANISME, 2 OCTOBRE 2023



Lors de la dernière séance du Conseil général, la Ville a adopté quatre nouveaux règlements modifiant les règlements d'urbanisme suivants. Veuillez noter qu'un avis de motion a été donné lors d'une séance précédente du Conseil.

## Règlement relatif à la salubrité et à l'entretien des logements

Ce règlement stipule que si un logement est dans un état d'obsolescence ou de délabrement, la Ville peut exiger qu'il soit réparé ou entretenu. Il décrit ensuite la procédure que la Ville doit suivre pour demander au propriétaire d'effectuer les travaux nécessaires. De plus, le règlement modifié inclut maintenant le bâtiment principal et le bâtiment accessoire, sans distinction d'usage.

#### Règlement concernant l'installation d'équipements mécaniques (équipement de chauffage, de ventilation, de climatisation, capteur solaire, thermopompe ou génératrice), à l'extérieur d'une propriété

Ce règlement stipule qu'un propriétaire doit désormais obtenir un permis pour installer un équipement mécanique à l'extérieur de sa propriété.

#### Règlement concernant la démolition d'un immeuble

Ce règlement élargit les conditions et le processus d'obtention d'un permis de démolition. Il précise les conséquences (qui, dans certains cas, peuvent être très sévères) de la démolition d'une propriété sans le permis requis. Une attention particulière est accordée aux biens ayant une valeur patrimoniale. (Loi sur le patrimoine culturel, chapitre P-9.002).


#### Règlement relatif aux tarifs

Comme l'indique le titre de ce règlement, divers tarifs ont été mis à jour. Ces tarifs concernent les permis accordés pour l'utilisation du domaine public, de façon temporaire ou permanente, pour une autorisation de travaux d'intervention (télécommunication, infrastructure, etc.) et pour le permis d'installation d'équipements mécaniques extérieurs.

### LE POINT SUR LE CENTRE SPORTIF ET RÉCRÉATIF

Si vous n'avez pas fait un tour sur Bedbrook récemment, je vous recommande de le faire. L'ancien aréna, la piscine et le chalet ont tous été démolis en moins d'un mois. Selon les résidents de la rue, le processus de démolition s'est déroulé sans difficulté. Étant donné que ce sont les résidents qui seront les plus touchés pendant la phase de démolition et de construction, le directrice générale et moi-même les avons rencontrés récemment pour écouter leurs préoccupations et leur apporter du soutien. Certains de leurs soucis étaient de nature plus générale et méritaient d'être partagés avec l'ensemble des résidents.

#### Déconstruction/décontamination:

La qualité de l'air a été contrôlée pendant le processus de démolition et les travailleurs ont porté des équipements de sécurité. Les déchets ont été triés et acheminés vers le site d'élimination des matériaux contaminés reconnu par le Ministère de l'Environnement, de la Lutte contre les changements climatiques, de la Faune et des Parcs.

#### Circulation:

Nous nous adresserons à l'entrepreneur pour nous assurer que les camions s'arrêtent complètement aux panneaux d'arrêt, respectent la limite de vitesse dans la ville et ralentissent à l'approche des dos d'âne afin d'éviter un bruit et des vibrations excessifs pour les maisons environnantes.

#### Horaires de travail :

Normalement, les travaux seront effectués entre les heures autorisées de la Ville, c'est-à-dire de 7 heures à 19 heures pendant la semaine, avec des heures plus courtes la fin de semaine si nécessaire.

La Ville s'est engagée à rencontrer à nouveau ces résidents pour les tenir au courant des calendriers des travaux et répondre à leurs questions.

Nous passons maintenant à la phase suivante du projet, qui commencera par la construction des fondations du nouveau Centre sportif et récréatif.

#### Collecte de fonds :

Nous passons également à la phase suivante de la collecte de fonds. Le service des Loisirs a organisé plusieurs collectes de fonds pour le nouveau centre et continuera à le faire tout au long du projet. Les prochains événements de collecte de fonds comprennent l'événement d'Halloween Plaisir Effrayant, la soirée dansante Rock n' Roll et le déjeuner avec le Père Noël. Nous vous encourageons à participer à ces

événements pour montrer votre soutien. Il s'agit d'une situation gagnante pour tout le monde, car non seulement vous contribuez à couvrir les coûts futurs, mais les événements eux-mêmes sont très amusants et offrent l'occasion de rencontrer vos voisins.
